Who We Are

The clinical social workers at the Center for Autism and Related Disorders (CARD) are highly valued members of our center's interdisciplinary team. Our clinicians are committed to addressing the needs of individuals on the autism spectrum, as well as offering support to caregivers and siblings.

Our social workers are licensed mental health professionals who have expertise in diagnosing and treating a variety of mental health concerns. Social workers also provide caring and knowledgeable support on treatment options, local and national community resources, and financial resources.

Through education, research, community outreach and advocacy, our social workers use their knowledge and understanding of autism spectrum disorder (ASD) to optimize quality of life in children and teens on the autism spectrum, and their families.

Who We Serve

While our clinicians are trained to work closely with individuals with ASD, we also address the following concerns:

- Anxiety disorder
- Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder
- Family-related concerns
- Intellectual disability
- Learning differences
- Life transitions
- Mild behavior challenges
- Mood disorders
- Parenting concerns
- Self-esteem
- Social skills

Our Approach

Clinical social work has a primary focus on the emotional and behavioral well-being of individuals and families. Our approach is holistic and strengths-based, with an emphasis on mental health and interpersonal relationships. Our clinical social workers partner with individuals on the autism spectrum and their families, empowering them to achieve their goals. Social workers meet with individuals on the autism spectrum and families to codevelop a plan that supports success at home, in the classroom and in the community.

Our Services

Mental Health Care

We tailor our services to the concerns and goals identified by the individual and family. Options include individual, group and family therapy. The length of treatment is individualized and depends upon the treatment goals and the needs of the individuals involved. Therapy is covered under the mental health benefits of most insurance companies.



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Clinical Care Coordination

Clinical care coordination services are designed to align families with community-based services intended to help them successfully meet their needs. Examples include helping families access healthcare, resources, early intervention services, services to support education, services supporting families and siblings, and funding for a variety of services, including legal assistance. Given the interdisciplinary nature of the services needed by individuals on the autism spectrum, many families find these services to be invaluable.
